Summer Bulbs a Blast!

Consider planting summer bulbs for spectacular color throughout the summer. As with spring bulbs, the summer varieties can be planted in existing beds, rock gardens, containers, and along walks. Summer bulbs also look great massed for a bright, strong appearance in the landscape.

Gladiolus (dwarf and regular size)

Caladiums (morning sun/afternoon shade)

Dahlias

Alliums

Asian Lilies

Agapanthus (winter indoors)

Remember to plant the summer bulbs after the danger of frost has passed. Also remember to add soil amendments to the existing soil for successful flower production.

Moving Firewood?

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB), an exotic beetle native to Asia, was fist found in West Virginia in Fayette County in October, 2007. At this time Fayette County was placed under an intrastate quarantine prohibiting the movement of any unprocessed Ash out of county without a compliance agreement from the state. Shortly after in May of 2009 the Emerald Ash Borer was found in Morgan County thanks to a call from a concerned home owner. Morgan County was placed under an intrastate quarantine at that time. In August of 2009 the West Virginia Department of Agriculture had another positive EAB find in Roane County, WV. At this time it was decided due to the location of the find and the difficulty to regulate this area that the quarantine would be changed from an intrastate quarantine to an interstate Federal quarantine. This means that Ash Nursery Stock, other unprocessed ash products, and hardwood firewood can now be moved throughout the state of West Virginia freely with out penalty as long as it stays within state's borders.

Think Unique in Side Yard Usage
Most residents have side yards that go

Most residents have side yards that go unused or aren't part of the total overall appearance of the site. Instead of ignoring this great space, why not create a separate garden experience or create a great storage area that can help with the clutter in the back yard. As with any landscape project, determine the priority of the need, views of the space, site dictation in relation to sun/shade, soil moisture, public/private space.

If the decision has been made to turn it into a garden, consider extending an existing planting bed or shrub border into the space. Remember to relate the new planting garden with existing gardens by the use of the same plants, colors, textures or shapes. If the space needs a transition from public to private space, consider several sections of fencing for an immediate change, or a natural change by planting an evergreen hedge approximately 15'-20' out from the house. Pull the plants out from the foundation so it doesn't crowd the lower side of the house.

The client can enjoy a meandering, curvilinear path with the installation of pavers, pea gravel, or flagstone. Mondo Grass, groundcovers, stepables (Mack, can you check the spelling) can also enhance the new path. Remember to create textural planting masses and color contrasts in small spaces.

If the priority has been made that organizational space is needed instead of a new garden area, consider assisting the client with required changes. First, does the space need to be screened and secured for storage usage? Nothing is worse than to see a cluttered yard with ladders, wheel barrows, toys, bikes, etc. Second, the space needs to be easily accessible for the client. How are they going to access this new organized space?

Is there enough room for a storage shed, storage bin, or can a storage unit be designed by you that can be placed under an eave so it isn't viewed from a window?

Consider placing some type of hardscape material down on the ground. Bark mulch chips and pine needles

works well for path materials. Pieces of level stones found along a road can also be placed on the ground so equipment and tools aren't placed on the ground. *next column*

Along with storage, this is a great place to create a work space. A potting table with storage space for pots, hand tools, and hoses, can easily be placed in this functional space.

Splash It Up With Low Maintenance Plants

Now is the perfect time to energize an existing planting bed with some fresh, low maintenance plants. Consider placing these new colorful plants where they will be viewed every day. If the space is viewed from a distance, massing of one particular plant will have a bigger impact than just one or two plants. If the location is above a wall, consider the plant based on texture and color. Also consider plants that contrast with another variety, whether by colors (purple and yellow), or leaf size (small detailed leaves in contrast with large rounded or spiky leaves).

- Brazillian Verbena and Hypericum contrast well in a sunny, well-drained existing bed.
- Marguerite Daisies, Purple Wave Petunias and Sweet Alyssum contrast well with flower size and color.
- Snowbank Boltonia, Firecracker Penstemon, and Sunny Border Blue Speedwell add colored texture to a sunny location.
- Smaller-sized plants such as Madagascar periwinkle (red or pink), Dwarf Zinnias,

- Creeping Variegated Thyme, and Dianthus work well together above a wall.
- * Kangaroo Paw (annual in WV), Coleus, Carex, Impatiens (pink, red, and white), and Hummingbird Mint brighten up a sunny morning, shady afternoon location.

• Hakonechloa, Tree Peony, Angelwing Begonia, PJM Rhododendron and Brunnera or Blue Siegboldiana Hostas will dazzle viewers

with texture contrasts and size contrasts.

Remember to assess the growing conditions of the space-lighting, moisture and nutrient levels. The site will dictate what will be successful and work for the selected location.
