Capitol Legacy Continues

When he read last spring that a stately tree on West Virginia's Capitol grounds in

Charleston was severely damaged and would need to be replaced, Mark Springer thought it would be a good idea for

donate a replacement. Springer, who owns Lavalette Landscaping in Lavalette, and has been on WVNLA's board for many years as had his father before him, remembered that the Association had planted a tree on the Capitol grounds in 1989 to commemorate the WVNLA's 50th year anniversary.

agreed with Springer's idea and approved the purchase. Carles Farley, grounds supervisor for the Capitol, was pleased with the offer and requested a large sugar maple (*Acer saccharum*), the state's official tree, to be provided as soon as possible. The tree was procured through Rusty Oak

Nursery in northern Ohio, as it was unavailable from an in-state provider, and planted Aug. 13 near the Attorney General's entrance to the Capitol.

Adaline Cumpston Awarded Longenecker Scholarship

Adaline Cumpston, who graduated from John Marshall High School (JMHS) in May, was selected as the 2025 George W. Longenecker Scholarship winner. Adaline is in her first semester as a horticulture major at West Virginia University. WVLNA established the Longenecker Scholarship in 2024 to encourage graduating high school seniors to apply for and enroll in the landscape architecture or horticulture programs at West Virginia University's Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design.


The program offers recipients full tuition reimbursement for four semesters while they maintain a 3.0 grade point average with full-time credits in either the landscape architecture or horticulture programs.

In addition to her impressive high school credentials, which included many AP and dual credit courses, Adaline was active in the JMHS FFA and 4-H. She said the time she spent working in the school's greenhouse helped hone her objectives. "I realized that I needed to focus on refining my skills rather than just learning the business side of things. I want to be hands-on and take pride in growing my own plants, not outsource the work. I also think it's important for women to get involved in careers in STEM, especially in fields like horticulture that are still mostly maledominated," Adaline said.

"We congratulate Adaline on the scholarship and welcome her into the nursery and landscape field. The scholarship is an opportunity for our association to invest in the future of our profession

and a way to honor a man who was instrumental in establishing a landscape architecture program at West Virginia University,"said Julie Robinson, WVNLA executive director.

George Longenecker dedicated a lifetime to the study and mentorship of landscape architecture and horticulture. He was instrumental in developing the landscape architecture program at West Virginia University, where he was beloved by his students and

Destructive Box Tree Moth Gains a Foothold in WV

The West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) has confirmed the presence of the Box Tree Moth (*Cydalima perspectalis*) in Berkeley, Jefferson and Morgan counties, marking the first detection of the invasive pest in the state. Native to East Asia, the Box Tree Moth (BTM) feeds primarily on boxwood plants (*Buxus* species), a popular ornamental shrub widely used in landscapes across West Virginia.



Since its initial detection in North America near Lake Ontario in 2021, the pest has rapidly spread and is now confirmed in Delaware, Massachusetts, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia.

will positively impact the environment and people for many years," Springer said.

The tree was delivered on a sweltering afternoon, where Capitol grounds employees had prepared a large hole. Board members Mark Springer, Bud Cottrill and Lisa McDavid were on hand to watch as the tree was carefully lowered into the hole.

While he waited for the tree's arrival, Springer wandered the grounds and found the substantial sugar maple he remembered WVNLA planting 35 years ago. He saw no sign of an identifying plaque, but Mark is confident he remembered the tree's location.

Visitors should have no problem locating Capitol's newest sugar maple, as it stands sentry at the southeast entrance (known as the Attorney General's entrance), soon to have a large plaque at its base. "This pest poses a serious threat to boxwood plants, which are foundational elements in many residential and



commercial landscapes," said Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. "Early detection is critical, and we're asking homeowners and landscapers to keep an eye out and report any suspicious damage."

BTM larvae feed on the leaves and bark of boxwoods, potentially causing complete defoliation and plant death. The lime-green caterpillars are small and difficult to detect in early stages, often blending in with foliage. Infestations may not be noticeable until significant damage has occurred. Signs of infestation include:

- Chewed or missing leaves
- Presence of small green caterpillars
- Webbing on or inside the plant
- Bark stripping in advanced stages

The pest can produce multiple generations per

year, compounding the damage if left untreated.

If caught early, BTM can be effectively managed with treatment options such as Bacillus thuringiensis kurstaki (Btk), a naturally derived pesticide safe for use on boxwoods and available at many garden centers. Multiple insecticides labeled



for BTM control may also be effective. Always read and follow all pesticide label instructions.

Anyone who suspects their boxwoods may be affected by Box Tree Moth is encouraged to contact the WVDA immediately for confirmation and treatment guidance.



Summer Meetings and Picnics Featured in Association's Early Days

In celebration of WVNLA's 85 years of service to its members and to the people of West Virginia, we're combing the archives to paint a picture of the Association's early operations.

Summer meetings and family picnics were a regular feature of the (then) West Virginia Nurserymen's Association when they met for their twelfth summer in 1950. The day's agenda on that Aug. 11 included a picnic and tour of Cole Nurseries, then located in Bluefield, VA. The hosts were Norman and Margaret Cole, owners of the nursery. Norman's grandson, Norman Cole III, is the current owner of Cole Nurseries.

A description of the event reads, "The picnic will be held rain or shine. There will be room indoors for everyone and we have movies and some games in case of rain. The Coles have quite a reputation as a song-and-dance team. If someone would ask them, in all probability, they would entertain us."

Twenty three members representing 16 nurseries attended. Of the nurseries listed, only one remains in operation today: Cole Nurseries.

The August 1949 summer meeting was held at the Tygart Hotel in Elkins, and members heard presentations on landscaping, plant diseases and business conditions, according to an article in the Aug. 20 Elkins Inter-Mountain. After the business meeting, members traveled to Stuart Recreation area for a picnic sponsored by Puzzell Nursery. In those pre-karaoke days, "Miss Dorthy Talbott and Miss Caroline Darkey of the Randolph County 4-H Club led the group in singing old and popular ballads," the article added.
